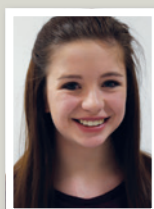

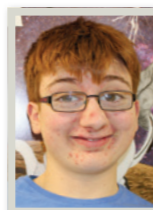

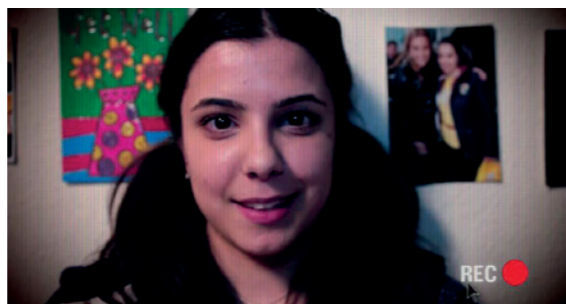

Having a heart condition can be tough, right? As young heart patients, we know this. However, a lot of people don't realise how tough it can be, and a lot of us don't realise how our conditions can affect friends and family. "My Story" and "Their Story" are twin films which illustrate perfectly just what effects a heart condition can have on a teenager and the people closest to them.

Created by young people, for young people, the films are based on true stories. The main character, Jamie, is at school (well, not quite) when she collapses during a fire drill. This is due to an undiagnosed heart condition which changes her life at school and at home. Both films use drama and comedy to great effect to give humour to a fairly serious story. However, the main trick of the pair of films is to show both sides of the same scenario.

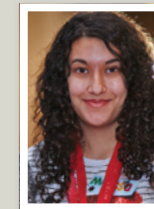
"My Story" is from Jamie's point of view whereas "Their Story" is from the perspective of her family and friends.

This works really well because it gives a detailed insight into the experiences of everyone involved and helps you to understand what those who are closest to you are going through. 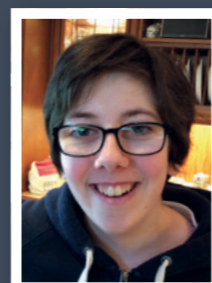
